June is Adopt a Shelter Cat Month! June 4-10 was recognized as Pet Appreciation Week.

I am sure you all have seen in the news and social media about the current ":Kitten Season" that is overwhelming shelters and rescues. We cannot stress enough the need to spay and neuter your pets, strays and ferals in your neighborhood. There are not enough homes for all the cats and kittens and each year the overpopulation gets worse and the rescuers are exhausted and frustrated with the 24/7 work and expense to spay and neuter cats as well as care for them. We remind everyone that a kitten can breed at 4 months old and have kittens at 6 months old. They can have 3 litters a year averaging 4-6 kittens each time. There aren't an abundance of low cost clinics and many people do not have the extra money to invest in cats that are "not theirs".

Too many cats and kittens are being abandoned, dumped and neglected. There are not enough rescuers or shelters to help all the daily urgent appeals to take them. Many people are

The Big Move: Helping Your Cat Adjust

Moving is stressful for most every one, including our feline friends. There are several steps that you can take to help the transition to a new home goes as smoothly as possible—and a lot of these tips also apply when bringing a new cat to your current home!

Set up a room in your home with as many familiar items as you can. The room should be secure and quiet, and provide them a safe space from all of the activities that go along with moving. Allow your cat to become comfortable with the one room before introducing them to the rest of the home.

Set up hiding spots, preferably in common areas. This will allow your cat to decompress, but also be near you.

Prepare to transport your cat.

Cats should be transported in a carrier to keep them safe and contained. If your cat is particularly stressed out by being in a car, you may consider reaching out to your vet for a sedative.

Get ready for day one! Your cat may not act like themselves at first, despite your best efforts to make the transition easy on them. An adjustment period should be expected. Which leads us to our last point...

Give them space. Do not force your cat out of their hiding spaces, but instead give them time and space to explore on their own. Always monitor their food and litter box to make sure they are getting what they need.
